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<u>1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Executive Summary

Swami Vivekananda Govt. P.G. College, Harda (MP) (formerly Government Arts and Commerce P.G. College, Harda) was established in 1963. This is the lead college of the Harda district AND recently the college has been promoted as PM College of Excellence by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of Madhya Pradesh which is affiliated to Barkatullah University, Bhopal M.P., and which is recognized by the University Grants Commission under 2 (f) and 12 (B) of UGC Act 1956. At present, the college offers three undergraduate courses and nine post graduate courses to enable young scholars with an equitable, holisticandquality inclusive education and impart value based knowledge amongst the students to this area. Curriculum isprepared and designed by the Central Board of Studies, Higher Education, Bhopal (M.P.). The college provides comprehensive information to thestudents about its goal, Vision & mission, its objectives, admission rules, courses offered, fee structure, scholarship and the availablefacilities through its prospectus, calendar, College Chalo Abhiyan and website. The College Administration is bound to abide by the government policy of education and the syllabi prescribed by the affiliating university.

The college is approved as a Research Centre also in the subjects of Commerce, Hindi and English.

Most of the faculty members developed E-Content NEP study materials as per the direction of DHE, Govt. of Madhya Pradesh. - All admissions to various programme/courses are done on merit basis with compliance to norms provided by the govt.
- A supportive and friendly atmosphere between teachers and students.
- A focus on gender equality and value-based education to empower and enlighten students.
- A Computer Laboratory with 20 computers with internet facilities.
- Career Guidance Cell is actively involved to conduct Rojgar Mela, skill-development and other career counseling programmes. Skill based Short Term Employability Training Programmes to improve students' employability.
- Conferences, seminars, webinars, workshops and invited talks expose students to the best minds and evolving fields of teaching and research.
- Faculty members attend Faculty Development Programmes, Orientation Programmes and Refresher courses and are provided timely duty leave for the same.
- Faculty members are actively engaged in development of e-content study materials as per latest NEP 2020 syllabus.
- Faculty members publish their research articles in the UGC Care Journals and peer reviewed referred journals of repute.
- Institution is approved as a Ph.D Research Centre in the subjects of Commerce, Hindi, History and English by the affiliated university Barkatullah University, Bhopal.
- A spacious and well-lit library with a reading room with intra access to e-publications via INFLIBNET.
- Student involvement in eco-friendly activities such as Ankur Abhiyaan tree plantation and nature visits.
- Approved as an IGNOU study Centre.

Institutional Weakness

There are so many shortages and weaknesses of the institution but even after that the institution is trying to give its best so that the vision and mission of the institution can be achieved. The institution has not sufficient campus for playground but our students are receiving awards/medals in every academic year continuously.

• The institution has not sufficient campus

- Need for bigger Central Library to accommodate the sufficient number of text books, references books, research journals every year.
- Required Research centre in more subjects resulting in lack of research facilities.
- Frequent transfers of teaching and non-teaching staff even in the mid-session.
- Acute shortage of teaching & non-teaching and supporting staff & laboratory staff.
- Dependence on current faculty due to restrictions on new recruitment by the Government of Madhya Pradesh.
- Scarcity of funds, complex and financial formalities poses great hindrance in developing infrastructure.
- Building is not sufficient for class rooms, laboratories, library, canteen, parking and gymnasium with the increasing strength of students.
- Indoor and outdoor Sports playground/facilities are not well furnished and equipped with modern sports facilities and infrastructure.
- Lack of Departmental Library.
- Lack of Smart Classroom.
- Lack of Govt. Staff Quarters.

Institutional Opportunity

- Regular faculty members with highly qualified have been appointed so there will be an opportunity to open Research Centres in more subjects provided sufficient infrastructural facilities are made available.
- NEP 2020 has been introduced which has lots of opportunities for students. The students can opt Major, Minor, Elective subjects, vocational Courses and value added and skill development courses as per their choices.
- To start new value added and skill development courses.
- Opening more Short-term courses, self-financed and skill oriented professional courses to cope with the competitive job market.
- Encouraging students to participate in online programs such as MOOCs, SWAYAM and NPTEL.

Institutional Challenge

- First and formost challenge is that the institutte has a very small college campus. There is an urgent need a sufficient college campus as per student strength.
- Filling up vacant regular posts and getting more posts sanctioned from the government to cope up with the student strength in each subject.
- Availability of highly qualified teachers for self-financed professional courses at low pay package.
- Providing a systematic learning process to help students from low socio-economic backgrounds to adapt new learner-friendly environment and perform at their best.
- To mobilize available funds for sufficient physical and other infrastructure considering the growing needs for classrooms, libraries, laboratories, books and equipments including computers.
- To increase the participation of students in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Curricular aspects and syllabus have been designed by the Central Board of Studies, Bhopal (M.P.). The college offers regular courses in B.A., B.Sc., B.Com and PG in Political Science, History, Economics, Hindi, Sociology, Chemistry and Mathematics. The institution also offers self-financial courses in B.Com. with Computer Application and B.Sc. with CS as well as M.Sc. in Computer Science etc. CBCS is implemented in UG courses like BA, B.Sc, B.Com from the academic session 2021-22. Students have independent to opt any kind of courses are available in our institution as per NEP-2020. Students have independent to opt any kind of courses as per NEP-2020. The college is approved as a Research Centre also in the subjects of Commerce, Hindi and History.

The college practices an academic calendar for the smooth and timely functioning of all the academic activities. The college provides comprehensive information to the students and the available facilities through its prospectus, calendar and website. Slow learners are facilitated with remedial classes while advanced learners are given special assignments encouraged to perform better. The average success rate of students during the last four years have been more than 90% in undergraduate and postgraduate courses. The average dropout rate is in undergraduate and in postgraduate level which is almost negligible. Various Certificate courses have been succussfully conducted last five academic years like Electricion Certificates, Beauty Pourlor, Judo Karate, Job Oriented Employability Training Programmes through LMS.

Institution organizes various co-curricular and extracurricular activities and special awareness programmes i.e. Child Protection, Adopt an Aanganwadi Masangaon, Ankur Abhiyan, Legal Literacy, Savethegirlchild,Violence against Women, Human Rights, Protection of Environment,Voter Awareness (SVEEP PLAN), Ban the uses of polythene and Anti-Drug awareness tobacco and alcohol. NSS unit of the college organizes many programmes i.e. blooddonation camp, tree plantation, personal hygiene, preventionfrom AIDS, TB, Cancer etc. Adoption of avillage/Aanganwadi is done which imprints a positive mark on community development.

As per existing mechanism of upgrading curriculum, the college receives feedback from the students and thestakeholders, which is incorporated in the curriculum to upgrade the teaching-learning process. The whole actof curriculum up-gradation is duly monitored and analyzed by IQAC.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution gives a lot of importance to efficient teaching, learning practices keeping the most important stake holder i.e. students in mind. The College adopts a transparent policy in admission through online process (E-Pravesh Portal) which is absolutely transparent and in accordance with the reservation cum merit norms of the state government. Student centric method is adopted for effective teaching - learning i.e remedial classes for slow learners, tutorials, revision and problem-solving classes, group discussions, guest lectures, PPT presentations, study tours, dissertations and seminars etc. The college library, e-library, upgraded laboratories and virtual class room facilitate the students to modern methods of teaching and learning. Students are encouraged to learn from E-Content Study materials also.

Institution emphasizes the holistic development of its students through a structured and systematic approach to teaching, learning, and evaluation. The enrollment has continously being above cent percent. The Institution has 82.71% of seats filled agianst researved categories (SC, ST, OBC etc.) as per applicable reservation policy for the first year admission during the last five years (2019-2024). The institution has strived to maintian

healthy students to teacher ratio. The institution has consistently maintained 100% full time teachers strenghth against the sanctioned post in the preceeding five years. The isntitution has sought to augument the percentage of full time teachers with NET/SET/SLET/PHD during the last five years (2019-2024) which now 71.50%. The pass percentage of students in last five years has risen to 94.75% of the institution.

Teaching: The teaching practices prioritize an interactive, student-centric approach. The college promotes experiential and participative learning through various academic and co-curricular activities. Laboratory work, field visits, internships, and project-based learning form an integral part of the learning process. Students are given opportunities to develop practical skills and apply theoretical knowledge in real-world settings, helping them to understand the relevance of their education beyond the classroom. Continuous assessment methods such as assignments, quizzes, presentations, and projects are used alongside traditional examinations to ensure a more holistic evaluation of student performance. The internal assessment process includes both formative and summative evaluations, enabling teachers to monitor progress and provide timely feedback.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Research, innovation and extension are the focus areas of the Institution's academic endeavours. The institute has recently constituted a Research Committee which encourages teachers and students to undertake research projects, publish their research articles in UGC Care journals, books and chapter in books. Most of the faculty members have completed Ph.D and other higher qualifications. Some faculty members have been approved PhD Research supervisor and guiding doctoral scholars. Over the last five years, 24 research papers have been published in various UGC Care-listed journals and International peer reviewed journals as well as 10 numbers of Chapters in Books have also been published by the faculty members. The Institution has conducted/organized more than 19 numbers of workshops/seminars/conferences on various topics during last five years.

The institution is committed to provide many significant extension activities for the holistic social and economic development for the neighborhood community and society. The last five years i.e. from 2019 to 2024 many significant Extension activities are carried out by the institute which are as under: Various initiative programmes have been taken by NSS unit to create the awareness among nearby villagers like Swacchta Awareness Campaign, promotes environmental protection through tree plantation & Ankur Abhiyan and other sustainable development programs, River Cleaning (a local river- Ajnal), Energy literacy Campaign, COVID awareness Campaign, COVID Vaccination Campaign, Health survey, Water Harvesting, Climate Change, Campaigning for Social Discrimination, Campaigning for Uses of Sanitary Pad & Hygiene for Girls students, Campaigning for inculcate awareness among domestic women related to education, economic and social security, Anti Drug Campaign, Joy of Giving programme in collaboration with Child line Institute (NGO) for donating clothes and other useful study materials to poor students, awareness programme for PACSO Acts, Malnutrition awareness program, Dowry system, Prevention of Child Marriage, Child protection programme and many other programs through Nukkad Natak by NSS Unit. The institution has adopted an Aganwadi in Masangaon and through NSS also adopted a village named Ranaikalan for providing and donating basic requirements which is benefited to them.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has a policy for the creation and enhancement of infrastructure in order to promote a good teaching learning environment, according to its vision and strategic objectives. The institution provides to students with basic infrastructure. The existing building has one Principal room, eleven class rooms, one hall, thirteen Departments, four staff room, Library, Office room, one reading room, one common room for girls, one examination control room, one store room, one RUSA Cell adjoining with Swami Vivekananda Career Guidance Cell, Five Laboratories, One Gymnasium and recently open gym installed in the campus and separate toilets for girls and boys students. Examination center is used for college internal and external examinations as well as for other universities like IGNOU, BHOJ etc. and MPPSC. The institute provides facilities of RO for pure drinking water. The institution campus is under 24-Hour CCTV surveillance for safety and security purpose for the students and staff. Also for healthy environment, our institute provides clean, plastic free and tobacco free campus to students.

The college has a well maintained and well equipped library as far as books are concerned. The college is able to provide e- library facilities and students are being benefitted by the facility -Library provides remote access to the students. In future as the infrastructure grows, the students of this institution are sure to benefit with the increased number of computers, smart classes and better internet facilities. Since this is a government affiliated college so institute updates its IT facilities when governments allocate fund/budget for these particular facilities. SWAN-Internet which is provided by Madhya Pradesh Govt. is being used to fulfill financial need of college like wages and salary of staff. BSNL Broadband –BSNL broadband is being used for conducting educational activities with virtue of university, Govt. of M.P. For student security and monitoring, CCTV cameras are installed in the classroom, campus, college entrance and exit and library. The institution ensures that the staff and student access to online teaching and learning resources and other knowledge and information and monitors the use of such facilities.

Student Support and Progression

The institute strives to support the overall development of students by providing a healthy and vibrant learning environment. Students are encouraged for actively participation in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Last five years, 181.16% percentage of students benefited by scholarships and freeships provided by the Government and Non-Government agencies. Every effort is made to build the overall development and competencies of students by organizing workshops, Career guidance programmes and training programs to improve their soft skills, communication skills, life skills, ICT literacy etc. Every year, a number of students progress to higher education through succeeding entrance examinations.

Training & placement cell is actively involved to provide the complete guidance to all the students for their career goals, developing skills and job placement under Swami Vivekananda Career Guidance Scheme. The cell is well equipped to handle and support the placement procedures. In order to achieve the goals, a series of lectures, training programmes, workshops and Monthly Career guidance programmes have been conducted/are conducting continuously for providing the complete information and guidance for their career Goals, jobs, entrepreneurship skills, startup, Job oriented skill training programmes, Short term employability training programmes through LMS. Rojgar Mela and Online /Offline Campus programs have been conducted for providing on the spot placement/job opportunities in various Govt. and Non-Govt. sectors. Many students qualify state govt./Central Govt. job in regular basis.The institute has a robust Student Grievance Redressal Cell, Internal Complaints Committee and an Anti-Ragging Cell. Students are actively participating in Sports and Cultural Activities. Numbers of students have won awards/medals at college level, University level, State, and National levels in Sports and Cultural activities. Recently the Alumni Association has been registered.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The vision of the institution is to develop as an educational hub with all modern facilities, innovations and branches of study by providing value based multidisciplinary quality education, employment oriented and holistic development to all the students. The institute has setup its vision and mission with national policies on higher education, focusing on education as a means of nation-building and social reform. To achieve this, the institute implements programs and activities such as NSS, Soft Skills Development, Value-Added Courses, Welfare Schemes, Sports, Cultural Programmes and Career Guidance programmes.

The institution functions in a well-structured manner where the administrative powers are decentralized and involves participative management for the smooth functioning. The Principal is the head of the institution and is responsible for supervising the overall functions of all institution. Staff Council committees are constituted every new academic session which work towards holistic development of the college through various plans and activities. Effective management is possible only through a decentralized and participative process through the IQAC and Staff Council Committees. The prime task of the IQAC cell of the college is to develop a system for conscious, consistent and catalytic improvement in the overall performance of institutions. The institute's accounts are audited regularly.

The institute encourages faculty to participate in professional development opportunities such as Orientation, Refresher Courses, Short-Term Courses and Faculty Development Programs. Faculty members are granted duty leave and financial support for attending Seminars, Workshops and Faculty Development Programs.

The institute has implemented e-governance in various areas such as Administration, Finance, Accounts, Scholarships, Student Admissions and Examinations. The performance of teaching staff is evaluated through a Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) and Annual Self Appraisal System (ASAR). The IQAC works to ensure quality and enhance quality measures within the institute.College has been provided financial add by the World Bank/ RUSA and State Govt. for the development, maintenance, renovations and Infrastructure in the college campus.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college has a dedicated cell, constituted for redressal of grievances ensuring women safety and well- being namely Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell with a well laid out policy. Question paper is prepared by individual faculty/ faculty members teaching the same subject. Quality of question papers are checked and final question paper is approved by concerned authority. Answer sheets are evaluatedand checked answer sheets are shown to the students. Sessional result analysis is discussed at HoD level.

Now student make project on the topics from mejar, minor subject. Student also make project for vocational and internship viva is also concocted by internal and external examiner in vocational subjects and in internship. The student can approach the teachers in case they need a clarification on the award of marks based on the scheme of valuation discussed in the class. The mark list for Internal Assessment will be prepared and displayed in the notice board. The Internal Assessment marks by the students are entered periodically in Barkatullah University Web Portal in two scheduled phases in a semester. Two internal tests were conducted. For assessment of laboratory course an internal practical viva conducted by respective faculty member at the end of course.

At the college level, an examination committee, comprising of a senior teacher as convener and other teaching and non-teaching staff as members, is constituted to handle the issues regarding evaluation process.

The college follows strictly the guidelines and rules issued by the affiliating university while conducting internals and semester-end examination. (1).Two internal assessment test are given during each semester. Time table for which is prepared well in advance and communicated to the students earlier. (2). Seating plan and preparation are time-table are marking is followed even for internal assessment tests and it is displayed on the notice board along with the Internal assessment time table. (3). After evaluation of internal assessment answer scripts, the scripts are given to students to have an idea of their performance in the test. If they come across any doubts, clarification is given which enables them to fare better in future. (4). By adopting the criteria as per the direction of affiliating university, complete transparency is maintained in internal assessment tests. Students and faculty members are made aware of the transparency to be maintained in the system of assessment. This is further enhancing the transparency and rapport between faculty members and students

The book bank facility provided by the library is free books and stationary to SC/ST students in each academic session. 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

College has active Janabhagidari committee. The committee levies development fees on the students and utilizes this for the development of the college as per the set rules and procedures of janabhagidari samiti.

Funds are utilized as per the financial Rules and store purchase rules stated by DHE GoMP.

Internal audit: College has a Finance committee comprising of the senior teachers of the college, Finance committee conducts the internal audit and committee verifies the income and expenditure details and submit the report to the principal. Janabhagidari Samiti has financial committee and it carries out the internal audit of Janabhagidari Nidhi. There are different cashbooks for Janabhagidari Nidhi, RUSA, Local and Govt. funds. Cash books and account books are also thoroughly checked by the internal audit committee.

External Audit: External audit is conducted once in every year after the completion of financial year by the independent Chartered accountant appointed by the Principal. External audits are conducted separately for Janbhagidari Nidhi, Local Fund, Govt. funds and other grants like RUSA and grants received for specific purposes. An audit report certifying the financial status of the college duly signed by the CA and Principal is received once the audit is completed.

(AGMP Gwalior) (Once in 3/5 years): This audit is scheduled once in 3 years or latest by once in 5 years by the Accountant General of M.P. based at Gwalior. A team constituted by AGMP Gwalior works on behalf of AGMP and generate audit reports.

The Institution has a Performance Appraisal System according to the rules of the Higher Education Department M.P. All the faculty members submit their self-appraisal reports (APAR) annually for assessment of their teaching learning evaluation, professional development, co-curricular activities, extension work, research publications, and academic contributions. The APAR is checked and verified by the IQAC and an overall API score is calculated according to the given format. The finalized report is forwarded to the Higher Education Department after the remark by the principal. Their performance appraisal system for non-teaching staff is based on work and responsibilities given and executed by them. The feedback from non-teaching staff is prepared by an administrative committee. A confidential report is prepared with the overall grading of all the employees. Gender equity is that condition of a society in which there is no discrimination between men and women in terms of availability of resources and opportunities. Presently youth have an important role to play for social change because youth is the future of the nation and if youth take their steps for gender equity then there will be no place for gender discrimination in society.

The college has a dedicated cell, constituted for redressal of grievances ensuring women safety and wellbeing namely Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell. The committee members are vigilant all the time and ensure that there is no such incident taking place in campus by creating awareness and having an open dialogue with all the students and female staffs. Anti ragging committee has been constituted and contact details of its members are displayed and communicated to all students. The above both cells havezero reported cases in the last academic session. The college celebrates National Girl Child Day and Women's Day on 24th January and 8th March respectively every year. The NSS unit of the college organises awareness programmes through Nukkad nataks /raising slogans to curb prejudicial practices against women like female foeticide, child marriage, good touch bad touch etc. Self-Defense training programmes for the female students were organized in the college- to make them aware about sensing attack and danger, to learn the skills of self-defence comprising of karate, judo and kick boxing, flexible body movement and some other practices. Maternity leave and child care leave as per rules are provided to the female faculty. There is no discrimination in pay, fees, perks, amenities, accountabilities, responsibilities, powers, recognitions etc. There is one girl's common room providing the basic amenities. Institute also motivate female students for registration in different government scholarship schemes like Post Metric scholarship, Gaon ki Beti, Pratibha Kiran, Mukhyamantri Medhavi Yojna, Sambhal Yojana etc. College organize "College Chalo Abhiyan" for spreading awareness higher secondary students about different facilities available in the college.

The College celebrates and organizes National and International commemorative days, events and festivals. Three days of national significance i.e. Republic Day, Independence Day and Constitution Day are celebrated with great zeal, strengthening the unity amongst the individuals and empowering them to seek their role and responsibility for National integrity and development. Other national days of significance like National Voter's Day, National Unity Day, National Youth Day, Gandhi Jayanti, Yog Diwas etc. are celebrated with equal vigour. 5. CONCLUSION

Now, the institution is going for the third cycle of re-accreditation by submitting its Self-Study Report (SSR-2024), a document that faithfully conforms to NAAC's latest guidelines and explicit its vision, mission and innovative initiatives in its pursuit of excellence.

It has been catering to the academic needs of the student of remote rural villages in the periphery of Harda town. At the same time, its beneficiaries also include the children of a large number of civilians of tribal villages. It is worth mentioning that about 78% students studying here belong to SC, ST and OBC categories. It is also goes to our credit that most of the girls prefer to study here in spite of existence of various private colleges. To put into other words, it is carrying out the Nobel mission of providing social justice to the downtrodden and women. In its last accreditation process in 2016-17, it has been accredited with 'C' grade.

The faculty members of the college consist of 14 regular staff and 15 Guest Faculties (against regular posts) with 13 temporary staff members appointed by Janbhagidari Samiti. The college has vibrant N.S.S., Career Counseling Cell, Personality development cell and Sports Departments. N.S.S. unit of the college is very much committed to instill the virtue of social service and moral values among the students. It has boys wing and regular annual camps are held in remote villages. N.S.S. are committed to promote plantation, carry awareness campaign on issues related to environment, AIDS awareness, pollution, dignity of women, prohibition, human rights, etc. Swami Vivekananda Career Counseling Cell of the college plays an active role by organizing career guidance programmes and self-employment training programmes. In the last five years, it has provided self-employment trainings in mobile repairing, computer repairing etc. It has its own library with collection of books to strengthen the academic efficiency to compete several competitive examinations.

The college has NSS unit of 100 volunteers each in Boys & Girls Unit separately. Through the NSS units, the college promotes student's involvement in contributing to good citizenship and holistic development of students.

Concluding Remarks :

Swami Vivekananda Govt. P.G. College, Harda (MP) was established in 1963. This is the lead college of the Harda district AND recently the college has been promoted as PM College of Excellence by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of Madhya Pradesh which is affiliated to Barkatullah University, Bhopal M.P., and which is recognized by the University Grants Commission under 2 (f) and 12 (B) of UGC Act 1956.

Group Accident Insurance policy is available for all the students. There are anti-ragging and student grievance cells in existence in the college both the cells are active and always ready to provide safe and healthy learning environment for students. Presently the college does not have a registered Alumni Association. The college facilitates student progression to higher level of education and towards employment through regular motivation and counselling by faculty members of the departments and other senior members of the college.

The Staff Council is the institutional statutory decision making body.
